

### WORDS OF WISDOM FROM A GUEST PASTOR!

## Dear friends,

I've heard it said many times over: "We are a divided people." No matter how you cut it, it looks a lot like this: Red states-blue states, Republican vs. Democrats, conservatives against liberals, right over wrong, "My dad can beat up your dad!" (I could have left that last one out.) Have you had one of those struggles talking with some-one that you disagreed with? Me too! Here are some tips I found that may make it easier to have those conversations.

- 1. Decide if that conversation is worth having. Every conversation can take a toll on energy, connection, and time. Is it worth that toll?
- 2. The topic may be very sensitive, ask if you can talk about it.
- 3. Keep it neutral. Start from neutral territory where no one is poking a stick in the other person's emotions.
- 4. Begin the conversation with understanding. As you show the other person you understand what it is they think, you begin from their perspective.
- 5. Look for where you agree.
- 6. Talk less. Give the other person space to respond.
- 7. Avoid using the word 'but'. When 'but' appears in a sentence, it negates everything that was said before it.
- 8. Tell stories that add specifics about differing perspectives. When stories are told the argument can be about ideas, productivity and overall goals instead of people or who's right or wrong.
- 9. Resist the current style to provoke. Take the opportunity when you can to reduce the emotional tension of the conversation and disarm the moment by choosing words carefully and lowering the tone of your voice.

I plan to use these steps the next time I am cornered by my irritant of an uncle who loves to prove he is always right on all things. (For more information, these tips were offered by Sarah DiGiulio in her NBC article entitled "Nine Tips For Talking to People You Disagree With". Many other similar articles are available with a quick internet search.)

Greetings Westminster family,

We are so fortunate the Pacific Northwest is not regularly racked by hurricanes and we have a stable food supply. Let's show our appreciation for God's gifts by giving back and generously to the One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) special offering.

Often one can think of lent as "what are you giving up?" But at their best, Lenten practices often involve both a personal, individual commitment and a communal experience. Our special OGHS offering is dedicated to hunger, disaster relief and self-development.

Here is just one example of the work your gift can fund:

Thirteen-year-old Trinity White Plume lives on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota where there is only one grocery store. Thanks to gifts from OGHS and partner organization Owe Aku, new garden projects put people in charge of their own food supply, nutrition, health and well-being. Trinity has learned to plant and tend the gardens, which include medicinal and ceremonial plants, and helps teach others to increase food security in their community.

We can all probably think of other examples where our offering could help to relieve some of those burdens. We often think of OGHS when we see the cardboard fish shaped coin banks that are used in Sunday School to involve the children in giving. But it is so much more than that.

The Lenten offering season this year begins February 17 and runs all the way through April 4, Easter Sunday. Please join us in helping other Presbyterian congregations with our OGHS special offering.

Listening to Hard Truths about the Community we Love and Live in.



## REMEMBERING MARK



Mark Eugene Lawrence Jr. of Salem passed away on January 22, at the age of 76 after a long fight with Parkinson's disease.

Mark was born in Twin Falls, Idaho, on December 6, 1944, to Mark and Alice Lawrence. He graduated from Medford High School in 1963 and from Oregon State University in 1967 with a BS in Range Management. He wed the love of his life, Carolyn, in October of 1970. He was blessed by the birth of his daughter, Sara, in 1973 and his son, Mark, in 1976.

Mark was a faithful public servant, working with the Bureau of Land Management and the Department of Interior for 32 years. He served in Nevada, California, Washington, D.C. and ended his career as the Associate District Manager in Salem, Oregon. He loved managing and protecting public lands. He was especially proud of his work with

wild horses and bringing various interests together to cooperate on public land use issues. He was integral in developing the Yaquina Head Outstanding Natural Area in Newport, Oregon, and the Wildwood Recreation Site near Welches.

His hobbies included landscape photography, hiking and traveling. He enjoyed U.S. history and loved listening to all types of music, but especially Christmas carols during his birth month. He delighted in time with family in all its forms.

Mark instilled in his children a love of the beauty of the outdoors and National Parks. He also bequeathed a love of music and community responsibility. He was a loyal and faithful provider for his family, who always had a smile on his face and loved a good laugh. Mark was also a respected and caring boss and co-worker.

Mark will be greatly missed by, and is survived by, the love of his life, his wife, Carolyn; his children, Sara and Weng-Keen Wong of Corvallis, Oregon, and Mark and Jennifer Lawrence of Milwaukie, Oregon; as well as his two granddaughters Cassidy and Victoria and foster grandchildren Eliza and Melodee.


Services will be held at Westminster Presbyterian, at 3737 Liberty Rd. S. in Salem, sometime in late summer 2021. Details will be released at a later time.

## REMEMBERING BOB

Robert Lee Ohmart left this Earthly world to be with his wife, Shirley, on January 23, 2021. Bob was born on November 6, 1937 in Salem, Oregon and lived here all his life. His ancestors arrived on the Oregon Trail and had early ties in the development of the city of Salem.

Bob carried on this family tradition of building Salem and giving to the community throughout his life. His first grade teacher wrote on his report card, "He is a good leader and can follow as well . . . Robert still gets excited at the slightest change in the schedule." Some things never changed.

Bob started a fruit stand as a teenager in the Four Corners area which helped pay his way for college. These early entrepreneurial skills shaped Bob's work ethics, his integrity, and his reliability. He graduated from North Salem High School in 1955. Bob attended Oregon State University majoring in business administration and minoring in building construction. This is where he met the love of his life, Shirley Reynolds.



They married on September 23,


1958. Bob and Shirley had four children: Julie Burnett of Driftwood, Texas, Kevin Ohmart of Salem, Holly Klein-Sheehan of Salem, and Heather Ohmart of Portland. In addition, they had 9 grandchildren and numerous great-grandchildren.

Bob joined his father and uncle's local real estate business, Ohmart and Calaba Realtors. He bought the firm in 1975 and continued as President of the company until retiring in 2003. Bob gave endlessly to his community. He was heavily involved in the Jaycees, Salem Board of Realtors, Salem Art Association, South Salem Rotary, State and National Association of Realtors, State and National Association of Homebuilders, Meals on Wheels, Habitat for Humanity, Salem Hospital Board, Mission Mill Museum Board, Salem Carousel Board, Salem Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Committee, and multiple committees at the Westminster Presbyterian Church.

In 1978, Bob was named Salem Realtor of the Year. He was awarded Oregon Realtor of the Year in 1986. Bob received the honor of Salem First Citizen in 1985 for all of his contributions to the community. Bob left a mark on this town and all those who he encountered. He would do anything for his family and his friends, and he will be deeply missed.

Bob is survived by his children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, and his sister, Judith McDonald, whom he loved dearly. An in-person service will be planned when gathering is safe again. In lieu of flowers, his family requests that donations be made to Meals on Wheels in honor of Bob's ongoing devotion to serving others.

## YOUTH PARK PROJECT SET TO GO!




## LET'S WELCOME PASTOR KELLY!
